Our Featured Speaker: Jennifer Sinsigalli (Pen name J .L. Rose)

A Massachusetts native, Jennifer Sinsigalli, pen name J.L. Rose, has called Duxbury home since 2015. Currently an employee of BASF, a global raw material producer, the mother of seventeen-year-old twins, and wife of an Ocean Spray employee, her family was fortunate to have the chance to relocate to historic Duxbury, where she could work at Plymouth Plantation as a historic interpreter, and complete her extensively researched novel, *Before the Mayflower*.


The project began in 2003, the pursuit ignited by a visit to the *Mayflower II*, in Plymouth Harbor. What captured the author's eye was a panel featuring the landscape of a town in the Netherlands. She found the story leading up to the crossing, especially the more than decade of refuge spent in Leiden, to be an important and fascinating piece deserving more attention and detail.



Sinsigalli, a 1996 graduate of Williams College, had an interest

in Dutch art and 17th Dutch history, after taking a course on this topic during her studies. The cover of the book, a painting by Hendrick Avercamp from c.1608, *Winter Landscape with Skaters*, which hangs in the Rijksmuseum in Amsterdam, beautifully captures the people of all classes from that period.

For fifteen years, research and writing progressed, with rare books requested from places like Brown University, the Boston Public Library, Wheaton College, and Plimoth Plantation. The quest for accuracy took her to London, Scrooby and Gainsborough in England, and Amsterdam and Leiden, among other places in both England and the Netherlands. Many hours with historians and other passionate people all contributed to capturing the details of the thirty-three years before the *Mayflower* crossing; from



religion to daily life, to the perils of fleeing one country to take refuge in another, and then to consider repeating that risky act.

Brewster, Bradford, Carver, Robinson, and Standish; these people and their families tell the story best, connected closely to a London printer and his family. Understanding the events and decisions leading up to boarding the *Mayflower*, offers a critical perspective and insight into the minds of our *Mayflower* ancestors. The novel, although historic fiction, has been accepted as credible by some of the finest institutions in the world, and is being sold by the Rijksmuseum in Amsterdam, the Pieterskerk in Leiden, and both Pilgrim Hall and Plymouth Plantation, (now known as Plimoth Patuxet). A portion of the proceeds will return to these and other churches and museums honoring and keeping this history alive.





2024 Gilman Montgomery French Scholarship¶

Congratulations to our 2023 Scholarship awardees! **Christina Neely** (College/Continuing Ed), \$1500 award for her historical paper *Overcoming Adversity: Territorial Conflict and the Evolution of Irish Indian Fighters on the Early American Frontier* **Lauren Wilder** (High School), \$1000 award for her documentary *The March on Washington: 250,000 People and a Dream* **Mary Grace Childress** and **Rory Dunagan** (Middle School), \$500 award for their presentation *Maria Tallchief: Dancing Through the Decades as a Native American Ballering*



We received several excellent submissions for the Gilman Montgomery

French Scholarship competition last May. In fact, we received many more submissions this year than we have in the last decade, demonstrating that our outreach efforts through the SC National History Day competition are successful! Two of the winning projects relate to the experience of Native Americans in North America, which is of special interest to our society given our ancestors' relationship and peace treaty with the Wampanoag tribe.

This year's theme was the same as the NHD theme: Frontiers in History: People, Places, Ideas. Because the NHD contest allows students to use a variety of formats for their projects, our contest allowed middle school and high school students to submit papers, poster exhibits, documentaries, presentations, etc. The College/Continuing Ed submissions were limited to a historical paper which followed the NHD rules for papers. Part of the requirements for NHD is to write a process paper. This year, we are publishing the process papers in the Palmetto Log, and the link to the full paper or project will be provided below as well.



Christina Neely, Camden, SC, College/Continuing Ed Division

Christina is a graduate student at Liberty University. We are excited to support her pursuit of a PhD in History! Christina is a descendant of William Brewster. Her parents, Mary and Jay Brandenberger, and sister, Deanna Brandenberger, are SMD-SC members.

Christina's paper did a great job representing how both the Irish/Scots Irish and Native Americans were pitted against each other in colonial warfare as the British and the French expanded their empires in North America

Overcoming Adversity: Territorial Conflict and the Evolution of Irish Indian Fighters on the Early American Frontier Link to full paper.

My process paper theme was chosen from my area of focus during my recent doctoral research. I had realized that the Irish and Scots Irish historiographies in America had been hotly contested at the turn of the 19th and 20th centuries, but that most of the research had not been empirical, and as a result was inherently biased; if somewhat unintentional. Different historians had sought to discuss the divergence between ethno religious groups such as the Irish Catholics and the Scots Irish Presbyterians, but in doing so, had failed to recognize the rich heritage that both groups had contributed to the modern American Irish diaspora and its rich history. I was introduced to this very intriguing dynamic within American culture when I married my husband, a proud

Appalachian American from a small and insulated village. His family has lived in the area since the late 1600's and still speaks a dialect of Scots. I was fascinated that such a rich and important cultural and social history had been so well preserved and desired to understand how and why these descendants of early Irish and Scots Irish Americans had continued to honor that history.

I believe that the theme of Irish Indian fighters on the early American frontier fits the theme of Frontiers in History: People, Places, and Ideas because the evolution of this group incorporates the evolutionary history of people, places, and ideas. Due to social beliefs, the Irish in early America were ostracized and pushed into the frontiers, which incorporates people, places, and ideas. Their evolutionary history of how they became Indian fighters was born out of the necessity of survival in such a climate.

My research on this topic has been conducted through travel to various archives, and researching primary sources in the form of documents, journals, and other important papers. I have also been fortunate to conduct research through various online archive databases. I created my project through hours of research, notes, citations, and rewrites of written essays; wherein copious amounts of empirical data were compiled. This essay has been trimmed down from a more expansive version which will be included in my Dissertation.

My historical argument is that the convoluted history of the Irish and Scots Irish as a border people for hundreds of years prior to their arrival on the American continent had prepared them for the physical adversity that they experienced on the American frontiers. Their ingenuity and adaptive spirit allowed them to adapt to Native American styles of warfare that would prove invaluable martially, and altered the outcome of European warfare on the American continent. This topic is significant in history because it illuminates the roles of a marginalized population in the evolution of warfare in early America. It is also important because recent historiography on the subject is minimal at best.



Lauren Wilder, Charleston SC, High School Division

Lauren is a 10th grade student at Porter Gaude in Charleston, SC. Lauren's documentary was well researched and presented the information very clearly, with both a logical order and good analysis of the subject. Judges were impressed with the source material usage as well. Lauren also used her research to present personal experiences of people at the time of the march, bringing new perspective to a well known event that had great impact.

The March on Washington: 250,000 People and a Dream

When I was thinking about what to choose as my topic for the National History Day competition, I knew I wanted to do the March on Washington in August of 1963 because I already knew so much about it and thought that it would fit the frontier theme best since it was an event that changed American History. The reason this march took place was due to frustrations over the voting inequality and segregation of African Americans. This event was a frontier in history because the march was successful in pressuring the JFK Administration to make a strong Federal civil rights bill. On June 19, 1963, JFK submitted a comprehensive Civil Rights bill to congress, which would later be signed into law in 1964 by President LBJ.

I did my research by gathering information from various websites, books, and news articles. I used a book called 'The March on Washington: Jobs, Freedom, and the Forgotten History of Civil Rights' by

William Powell Jones, national archives, and history.com. The sources that I found most useful were the news articles that shared the stories of people who were present at the march. I liked reading about people's experiences since it helped me to get a better understanding of the event. I also liked to get information from national archives about the march since I wanted to know the key points as to why the March on Washington took place.

After finding all of my research, I used it to write my paper. Then, I used my paper to make voice recordings of myself reading it, which I then used as my voice overs in my iMovie. I found many different pictures of my topic to use for my iMovie, as well. I found pictures that showed the march in a way that people who didn't know about it before, or didn't know much about it, could understand it better. I liked finding pictures of the march on different archives that are considered rare.

My project is based on the opinion that the March on Washington was the turning point in the Civil Rights Movement. The March on Washington was one of the largest, yet peaceful protests, in American history from the Civil Rights Era. It helped to get the Civil Rights Act of 1964 passed. The high amount of media coverage that it got helped to bring attention and awareness to the problems and struggles of everyday African Americans and what they wanted to be done to fix those problems. The main problems that needed fixing were voting inequality and segregation. Because of the mass amount of attention that was given to the march, the government was pressured into passing the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965 that same year. Together, the bills made segregation in public places prohibited and discriminatory practices in employment and with voting.

Mary Grace and Rory attended Orange Grove Charter School last year, and they are both attending West Ashley High School this year. Mary Grace is in the Scholars program at WAHS.

Mary Grace and Rory took a personal interest in Maria Tallchief's story through their own love of dance (they are both ballerinas). The students form vital foundational research throughout their annotated


bibliography leading them to a well-rounded thesis statement that was well-proven throughout the project.

Maria Tallchief: Dancing Through the Decades as a Native American Ballerina Link to poster presentation and annotated bibliography

We chose Maria Tallchief as our topic for this year's National History Day Project. She was a Native American ballet dancer who became one of the most influential females in the dance world, despite her nationality. We are both dancers and wanted our topic to relate to us personally. As dancers, we wanted to learn more about how past ballerinas have changed and influenced the world of ballet today. We wanted to prove that Maria Tallchief paved the way for a new frontier in ballet by creating new opportunities for minority dancers. The Disney series On Pointe first brought our attention to Tallchief and her legacy. As we researched more about her, we realized just how influential this Native-American woman was. One of our dance teachers, Lindy Fabyanic, trained at the same studio as Maria Tallchief, and this connection provided us with valuable information as we researched the life of a New York City prima ballerina.

We used many reliable online resources, including the New York Times Online Archives, which we used to show how people honored and appreciated Maria Tallchief after her death. We looked through the School of American Ballet (SAB) (website, where we found an article about Tallchief's career at the New York Ballet. We used quotes from Maria Tallchief to show her perspective throughout the major events in her life, and valuable pictures of her while she was dancing at SAB. We found an autobiography by Maria Tallchief that explains her early life, her career as a ballerina, and her life after she retired. This was an extremely valuable primary source. To create our exhibit, we used a cardboard tri-fold, a pink paper background, and black and white pictures in order for them to not contrast with the pink. We also used our own pairs of pointe shoes as 3-D visuals to make our exhibit more attractive.

With our exhibit, we are trying to prove that Maria Tallchief's hard work and perseverance forged new opportunities for many other minority groups, especially in the dancer community. This topic is significant to history because it shows yet another way a person of minority background and nationality changed the perspectives of many. Although some people tried to discourage Tallchief and prevent her from reaching her goals, she broke through countless barriers and became the most influential dancer of her time. She taught future generations to fight for what is worth fighting for, and proved that everyone can succeed despite their differences. Our project topic especially connects to this year's NHD Theme, Frontiers in History: People, Places, Ideas, due to Tallchief's ability to overstep major boundaries and setbacks.






Travels with George, In Search of Washington and His Legacy,

The author, his wife, Melissa and their dog, Dora, retraced the several 1789-91 post-inaugural travels George Washington took, after 6-months in office. Reluctant to take the office of President, he took this on as a mission. He was compelled to see the people, these colonies, and begin to have them pull together.

Philbrick researched extensively, not just by contacting the Historical Society in each town he was to visit, but seeking out the expert on the Washington 1791 visit to their area, arriving, then meeting with librarians, curators and descendants.



Though a special carriage was built for Washington, only a half dozen people accompanied him, with no security detail. The author paints quite a word picture when he writes of President Washington, at 6 foot 4 inches tall preparing to enter a town by leaving his carriage, donning his Revolutionary War Uniform, and mounting his white stead, Prescot, and trotting in alone. What a sight! (I listened to his hour-long author talk and heard this part firsthand). Sometimes, he arrived in his plain brown suit, wanting to be part of the people. Many challenges awaited, as the anti-Federalists and other special interests were everywhere.

I have read there were four trips: Pre-Inaugural from Mount Vernon, Va., to New York City, April 16 through 24, 1789; New England from Kittery, Mass. (now Maine) to Greenwich, Conn., Oct. 15 through Nov. 3, 1789 — Long Island from April 20 through 24, 1790; and the longest trip, the 1,800-mile trek of the South from March 21 through July 6, 1791.

Washington came out as the heroic leader this country desperately needed. It is an extraordinary read. Enjoy!

Report from 2023 Congress

Thursday through Wednesday, September 8 - 13, 2023, The General Society of Mayflower Descendants (GSMD) held the Forty-Third General Congress (GC) in Plymouth, Massachusetts. Occurring every three years in September in Plymouth, the GC is comprised of the Twelve-Member Executive Committee (EC) officers, Former Governors General (FGG), Former Assistant Governors General (F-AGG), Deputy Governors General (DGG) and Assistant Generals (AG) and delegates from the 54 Member Societies.

Sunday night, Melana and Jeffrey, along with DGG, AG and Acting DGG & AG from other Member Societies, attended the GSMD General Board Of Assistants (GBOA) Meeting where GSMD Acting Executive Officers were appointed, DGG, AG and Acting DGG & AG answered the Roll Call, and conducted other GBOA business in preparation for the General Congress (GC). The GBOA is made up of the Twelve officers of the Executive Committee (EC), and the 54 Member Societies' Deputy DGGs and AGs. The Executive Committee officers are: the Governor General (GG), Assistant Governor General (AGG), Secretary General (SG), Treasurer General (TG), Historian Elder General (EG), Captain General (CG), Surgeon General (SnG), Counsellor General (CG), and Three Members-at Large (MAL).

Delegates Barbara (Brandi) Gibbons, Melissa Gibbons (SMDSC Surgeon), Deborah Hill (SMDSC Palmetto Log Editor), Marylen Jackson (SMDSC Recording Secretary), Debra Lebar, Nick Maher (SMDSC Historian), Dave Smith (SMDSC Captain), Desiree Vogel (SMDSC Elder), and Bonnie Wade Mucia (GSMD Executive Committee Member-at-Large, SMDSC Former Governor) along with SMDSC's Assistant General (AG) Melana Maxie and Deputy Governor General (DGG) Jeffrey Jackson represented SMDSC at the General Congress.

Monday and Tuesday, the two business days of the General Congress (GC), our Delegation, along with Delegates and AG's and DGG's from other Member Societies in the United States and the Canadian, Europe, and Australian Member Societies, met with the GSMD EC Officers, FGG, and F-AGG to conduct GC business. We voted to approve proposed GSMD Bylaws and GSMD Charter changes reported to the GC by the 2022 meeting of the GBOA held last year in Minneapolis, Minnesota. Executive Committee members and Committee Chairpersons reported their activities and the financial status of GSMD, presented the Annual Audit and GSMD 2023-2024 Budget. After extensive discussion and votes on the proposed increases in the fee to decrease the shortfall in costs covered by the current fee for processing submitted GSMD Initial Membership and Supplemental Applications, the GC approved a \$25.00 increase which will partially address the costs borne by current GSMD General Funds.

Near the end of the Congress, on Tuesday, from the slate of nominees presented by the Nominating Committee Report and nominees from the floor, we elected New Executive Committee Officers, installed Tuesday night at the General Congress Reception and Banquet, Installation of Officers, to serve through the next General Congress in September 2026; DGG and AG nominees submitted by each Member Society were also elected for the next three-year terms. Melana Maxie and Jeffrey Jackson SMDSC's nominees for AG and DGG, respectively, were elected to represent SMDSC on the GBOA for additional three years terms. Next year's GBOA Meeting will be held in neighboring Asheville, NC.

Minutes of April 22, 2023 Board of Assistants Meeting¶

Nine members were present for the zoom BOA meeting on Saturday, April 22, 2023. They were: Governor and AG Melana Maxie; Deputy Governor Debi Bacon; Treasurer Janet Morris; Historian Nick Maher; Captain Dave Smith; Elder Desiree Voegele; Assistant for Education Kristen French; Assistant for the *Palmetto Log* Deborah Hill; Deputy Governor General Jeff Jackson. Absent members were: Surgeon Melissa Gibbons; Assistant for Juniors Cari Gillette; Corresponding Secretary Karen Andrews; Recording Secretary Marylen Jackson.

Governor Maxie called the meeting to order at 2:01 p.m. Deborah Hill made the motion to accept the agenda as e-mailed to members. Debi Bacon seconded, and the motion passed.

<u>Officer Reports</u>: <u>Governor Maxie</u> has made preliminary research on the large Bible passed on to her. The suggestion was made for her to bring it to the Compact Day meeting. She will bring items from the store for sale to the luncheon next week. Deborah Hill will host the next zoom Book Club on May 8th when we discuss CALEB'S CROSSING by Geraldine Brooks. Melana reported on the surprise amount of money raised to present to the Governor General for the repairs to the Mayflower Society House in Plymouth. She said that Frances Frame is being trained as Deputy Governor in November.

<u>Deputy Governor Debi Bacon</u> announced that 70 reservations have been made for the Spring meeting and luncheon at the Poseidon Restaurant in Hilton Head next Saturday at 11:30. The menu includes a salad, chicken or beef, mixed vegetables, pasta, and dessert. There will be a cash bar. Three tables will be set up for: 1) registration, 2) the store and library books, and 3) other paraphernalia such as Life Membership forms, as dues go up in June, and menu cards. Fresh flower bouquets will be on each of the 9 round tables. A screen and outlet are provided for the speaker's program. Sixteen BOA members and spouses have made reservations to attend the dinner honoring our Governor General, Jane Hurt, at the Freddie Bones restaurant in Bluffton Friday

night. Dress is business casual and each one pays his own bill. The November 11th Compact Day meeting/luncheon will be held at the Piedmont Club in Spartanburg with a choice of 2 entries, small salad or soup, and dessert. The cost is \$45. There is no cash bar, but one may purchase tickets and pay the bar tender with them. Men must wear jackets. The speaker will be Jennifer Grinsigale (J.L.Rose.) Members agreed to pay for her travel expenses from North Carolina and her hotel accommodation for one night. She may bring some of her books for sale.

<u>Captain Dave Smith</u> said he would bring and set up the US flag and the Mayflower flag at the meeting location next Saturday.

<u>Treasurer Janet Morris</u> announced that \$25,000 was put into a short-term CD and earned \$250.00. She will meet with former Treasurer Kathy Landing in May. The balance as of 12/31/22 was \$6,788.95 and as of 4/15/23 is 20,617.99. The Raymond James account is \$250,731.32. The Balance in the checking account as of April 15, 2023, is \$237,310.31.

<u>Historian Nick Maher</u> said there are 8 applications now in Plymouth. Three apps are awaiting payment before being sent to Plymouth. A dozen apps are not active. About 637 South Carolina members have been added since Nick first took office 15 years ago! Two new co-historians are being trained to take over after Nick's term ends in November.

<u>Assistant for the Palmetto Log Deborah Hill</u> said she needs all submissions by the end of August or earlier. By necessity, pictures and articles from the September Congress in Plymouth will have to be added later.

<u>Assistant for Education Kristen French's</u> term will expire in November, but she will be glad to help her successor. She announced the 7 applications for the Gilmer Montgomery French scholarship have been received. The deadline is May 1.

<u>Old Business</u>. In the Governor's challenge proposed by Melana a year ago, \$3720 has been raised to present to the Governor General for repairing the Mayflower Society House. A motion was made and carried out to provide \$280 from the present checking account to make it \$4,000.

<u>New Business</u>: The nominating committee recommended nominees for AG Melana Maxie and for DDG Jeff Jackson to be elected by the GBOA at the tri-annual Congress September 10-12, 2023, to serve 3-year terms. Dave Smith from the nominating committee moved that the SMDSC BOA accept them as nominees. No seconding of motion was needed because the committee made this recommendation. The BOA approved the motion.

According to the number of members in our South Carolina society as of December 31, 2022, we can send 9 members in addition to the AG and DDG. Only \$5,000 is provided for delegates to Congress in the budget. Treasurer Janet Morris made the motion to exceed this amount to allow 9 delegates

to attend and each be provided \$1,000. Nick Maher seconded, and the motion passed. Seven names were presented as delegates to be appointed: Melissa Gibbons, Deborah Hill, Marylen Jackson, Nick Maher, Don Rogers, Dave Smith, and Doug Smith. Melana made the motion to appoint these seven as delegates. Dave Smith seconded the motion and it passed. Two more delegates will later be presented to the BOA for appointment. (All delegates will present their receipts from attending Congress to the treasurer before the \$1,000 will be given to them.) Debi Bacon suggested we write a policy about the delegates to be added to the By Laws next year.

The names of Doug Rogers and Don Smith for Co-Historians and Frances Frame for Deputy Governor were presented by the nominating committee (Nick, Janet, Karen, Deborah and Dave.) Dave Smith made the motion to accept the slate of officers presented, no second needed. The motion passed. All the delegates need to have a zoom meeting to discuss the 11 amendments as proposed in the Spring Mayflower Quarterly. Minutes will be taken at this meeting.

Debi Bacon made the Motion to adjourn the meeting at 3:33. Desiree Voegele closed the meeting in prayer. The next scheduled BOA meeting will be November 4, 2023.


