Mary Brandenberger - Historian

King Philip's Chair

While in Plymouth for the 43rd Congress last September, Melana Maxie and Don Browning took a day trip to Bristol, RI to spend some time exploring the area of King Philip's Chair in the Miery Swamp. We were not sure what to expect, but we were delighted! We parked at the parking lot for the Haffenreffer Museum's Collections Research Center, and headed in. The path was more overgrown than pictures on the internet showed, but it was an easy walk to the outcrop.

In the 1600's this area was part of the Wampanoag/Pokanoket tribe's lands known as Sowams. The "chair", at the base of the largest outcrop of white granite in Rhode Island, served as the seat of Metacom (known by the English colonists as King Phillip). It is said that Metacom held meetings here and the top of the rock served as a lookout. From 1675 to 1678 a war between the Native Americans and English colonists was fought in this area. The King Philip's War was by far the bloodiest war in American History (per population) as nearly 10 percent of the population were killed on both sides. Some of the fiercest fighting occurred in the nearby towns. King Phillip met his end in Miery Swamp a mere half mile southwest of King Phillip's Chair on August 12, 1676.

Today, Brown University owns 376 acres of woodland on Mt. Hope off Tower Street in Bristol, RI. The university's grounds on Mount Hope include King Philip's Seat (or "chair"). To visit the location, one must receive permission from Mount Hope Farm at 401-254-1745 for permits and parking passes.



Announcing the 2024 Gilman Montgomery French Scholarship

The Society of Mayflower Descendants in the State of South Carolina announces the Gilman Montgomery French (GMF) Scholarship. Any student in South Carolina or descendant of one of our members may apply. Every year our theme follows the <u>National History Day (NHD)</u> theme, please check the NHD website for this year's theme, rules, and how to get started. There are many resources at the NHD website to guide you on the theme and on submissions to their contest.* Our rules for submissions follow the NHD Contest Rule Book.† Any historical subject which relates to the theme is accepted. Our intent is to encourage students who are interested in history by recognizing



that they will do their best work on a subject they feel connected to and have chosen themselves.

Divisions for the GMF Scholarship include:

\$500 – Middle School (6th – 8th grade)

\$1000 – High School (9th-12th grade)

\$1500 – College/Continuing Ed (enrollment in 2 year or 4 year college/career school, or graduate school; age requirements 18-24 years old. Seniors in High School should apply to the High School division.

Middle and High School Division: Students may choose from the two options below. If choosing to write an essay, we strongly encourage submission to your local, regional, and/or state NHD competition. All applicants are strongly encouraged to work with their history and/or ELA teacher(s).

A. Essay (1500-2500 words): refer to the NHD Contest Rule Book. Include the Title Page and Annotated Bibliography as described in the NHD Contest Rule Book.

B. NHD project: submit the written materials described in the NHD Contest Rule Book. This includes a Title Page, a Process Paper, and an Annotated Bibliography. Audiovisual or performance projects should provide a link or a supplemental document.

College/Continuing Ed Division: Students should write an essay which relates to the NHD theme. The GMF scholarship follows the same rules as the NHD Paper Category:

Essay shall be 1500-2500 words: refer to the NHD Contest Rule Book. Include the Title Page and Annotated Bibliography as described in the NHD Contest Rule Book.

Other requirements: All submissions must have a cover sheet which includes: (1) contact information for the applicant (and for all group members, if applicable); name, best phone number, and mailing address are required. (2) For MS and HS, please include the name and

contact information for your teacher/advisor. (3) Indication of the Division you are submitting to (MS, HS, or College). (4) Group projects must include a statement from all group members agreeing to the submission.

The deadline for applications is noon, May 1 (or postmarked by May 1). You may reach out to Education Chair, Holly Lohnes (edasst.sc.mayflower@gmail.com) with any questions. 

Mayflower Virtual Book Club Reviews

Penelope Winslow, Plymouth Colony First Lady: Re-Imagining a Life. by Michelle Marchetti Coughlin

In the telling of Penelope Winslow's story, the author sheds interesting additional light on life in Plymouth Colony from the 1630's to the early 1700's using information from historic sources other than relying solely on personal letters and existing historical writings. The book's opening is artfully composed and the author includes photographs of Winslow family personal objects that survive in museums today. Entries in court documents and records of real property transactions build the story of the Winslow family and of the second generation of Pilgrims.


While Penelope Winslow was not a Mayflower passenger, she

becomes a character of interest with the intertwining of her adventuresome family and the changes that took place in Plymouth Colony's years after the Pilgrims arrived. The author provides informative, well researched detail concerning the political changes as the colonist's populations in New England grew, the interactions with the Indigenous Peoples, and changes that eventually led to the American Revolution. The Mayflower Book Club members expressed their enjoyment in the reading and Zoom discussion of this book.

Women of the Mayflower, by Read Books, Ltd., UK

Published by Read Books, Ltd, UK, this volume is a composite of the writings of three authors: Mrs. John Logan, (1838-1923) wife of a Union Army General; Annie Russell Marble (1864 - 1936) of Worcester, MA, and Fredrika Bremer, a Swedish writer who visited the US and met several prominent American authors of the day in the mid-1800's.

In addition to those women who made the Mayflower voyage, Mrs. Logan mentions a significant number of other women who figured in the early history of the Mid-Atlantic states and the beginnings of the various mid-western settlements. Annie Russell Marble surveys historical events of the early colonial settlement, including familiar hear-say about the Plymouth



Colony story. Fredrika Bremer writes sympathetically about the history with its multitude of challenges faced by the Plymouth Colonists and their responses to those challenges. Book Club members found this book somewhat less enjoyable than others that have been discussed. On a scale of 1 to 5, with 5 being the most enjoyable, the Book Club members' rating average for this book was 1.8.



<u>Compact Luncheon Meeting Minutes,</u> November 11, 2023

Members and friends of the SMD-SC met Saturday, November 11, 2023, at the Piedmont Club in Spartanburg. Preceding the meeting many enjoyed visiting "The Store" and the "Library" and viewing the displayed articles belonging to Former Governor Gilman Montgomery

French.

Governor Melana Maxie called the meeting to order at noon and welcomed all, especially the new members. Elder Desiree Voegele gave the invocation and prayed especially for the veterans on this special day. Captain Dave Smith led all in the pledge of allegiance to the flags, then Karen Andrews Corresponding Secretary, led in the Pilgrim's Pledge.

Upon hearing their ancestor's name read out by Captain Dave Smith, each Mayflower descendant stood to be recognized. Surgeon Melissa Gibbons kept the tally and found that John and Elizabeth Tilley Howland had the most descendants (11) present.

Following the meal, Debi Bacon introduced Jennifer Sinsigalli from Massachusetts, who talked about the historical novel, *Before the Mayflower*, which she, as J. L. Rose (her pen name) had written. Her travels to Amsterdam, Leiden and England in search of names and places made the book more accurate and readable. Many lined up after the meeting to purchase a copy of Jennifer's fascinating-sounding book.

The 2023 award winner of the Gilman Montgomery French Scholarship for College or Continuing Education students, Christina Neely, (a Brewster descendant) was introduced and congratulated on her excellent paper about how both the Scots/Irish and Native Americans were pitted against each other in colonial warfare as the British and French expanded their empires in North America. Christina thanked the Society for this financial award which helps her pursue a PhD in History at Liberty University.

The slate of officers for 2023-2026 was presented and all were elected by acclamation. The new members of the Board of Assistants are Deputy Governor Frances Frame; Corresponding Secretary Sarah Hoyle; Treasurer George Unsinger; and Historian Don Smith. Continuing officers are Governor Melana Maxie; Recording Secretary Marylen Jackson; Surgeon Melissa Gibbons; Elder Desiree Voegele; Captain Dave Smith; Counselor Sarah Clingman. Also Assistant for the Palmetto Log Deborah Hill; Assistant for Juniors Cari Gillette; Assistant for Education Holly Lohnes.

Melana reminded everyone of the Day of Mourning that indigenous people recognize instead of Thanksgiving, and remembered how the Wampanoag helped to save the lives of the Pilgrims that first year in the new world. She wished everyone a Happy Thanksgiving. Elder Desiree Voegele closed the meeting in prayer.

Minutes of January 13, 2024 Board of Assistants Meeting

Governor Melana Maxie greeted all and opened the meeting at 2:15 from her telephone. The members present were Governor and AG

Melana Maxie; Deputy Governor Frances Frame; Treasurer George Unsinger; Historian Don Smith; Corresponding Secretary Sarah Hoyle; Palmetto Log Editor Deborah Hill; Recording Secretary Marylen Jackson; Captain Dave Smith; Surgeon Melissa Gibbons; Assistant for Education Holly Lohnes; Assistant for Juniors Cari Gillette; and Deputy Governor General Jeff Jackson. Absent Counselor Sarah Clingman.

The governor introduced all the new BOA members: Deputy Governor Frances Frame; Corresponding Secretary Sarah Hoyle; Treasurer George Unsinger; Assistant for Education Holly Lohnes; and Historian Don Smith.

In the Governor's Report, Melana enumerated many of the 2023 goals which were met. Members of the Zoom Book Club met four times. The spring and fall luncheons were well attended. Continuing sales from the store netted a profit in 2023 of approximately \$4700. The governor listed the nominees for committees and chairmen as follows: Finance - George Unsinger & Janet Morris; Resource - Holly Lohnes, Cari Gillette & Pam Snyder; Bylaws and Policy - Dave Smith, Deborah Hill & Jeff Jackson; Recognition & PR - Deborah Hill & Frances Frame; The Store - Desiree Voegele, Cari Gillette and Susan Thompson. All nominees agreed to serve, so Melana appointed them to their respective committees.

Melana reported on the dues drive. The Finance committee met with the investment advisor on January 5th. The GSMD has passed a change to increase application fees from \$125 to \$150. Our application fee should remain at \$230 with no loss of income. Frances Frame made the motion and seconded by Dave Smith to keep our fee the same. All voted by hand, so it was accepted.

Melana sent out 88 e-mails to all Life Members on November 7th. 23 people responded. Six volunteers contacted "lost" members by phone, with good results. Six members are still "in the wind."

Deputy Governor Frances Frame announced that the Saturday April 27th luncheon/meeting will be at the Hopsewee Plantation in Georgetown, SC. Tours will be given after lunch for those signing up. Reservations can be made at the George Hotel for those wishing to spend Friday night in Georgetown. Luncheon decorations were discussed. Treasurer George Unsinger reported that the Truist Bank Balance as of 12/31/23 was \$21,352.04. The Raymond James Investment account ending balance as of 12/29/23 was \$273,702.33.

Corresponding Secretary Sarah Hoyle is working on the annual report which is due February 1, 2024.

Education Assistant Holly Lohnes sent her report to the Governor General on December 19th, 2023. The theme for 2024 is "Turning Points in History" which is the same as the National History Day theme. She asked for advice on different ways to announce the scholarship essays or projects. Any SC student or Mayflower relative in good standing may apply for the scholarship.

Under New Business: The GSMD Passenger Inheritance Program (PIP) was discussed. This allows members to "inherit" ancestors without completing supplemental applications at a cost of \$150. Ancestor bars and Certificates may be purchased. Inherited passengers are NOT ELIGIBLE to be inherited by future generations. How will SC treat these inherited members? SC needs to decide and make a policy for it. Deborah Hill made the motion to receive the PIP, seconded by Dave Smith. After discussion the motion was tabled until our next meeting.

Governor General Lisa Pennington will be our speaker at the 2025 Spring Meeting in Charleston. Melana proposed that we challenge members again to add monies to their dues

(beginning August of 2024) to present a nice sum to Lisa for her mission which is "To tell the Pilgrim Story." (We had presented former Governor General Jane Hurt with \$4000 for her project – the Mayflower Society House.) Dave Smith made the motion to make the challenge for Lisa's mission. Cari Gillette seconded. Jeff suggested we amend it to start working on the challenge, as soon as possible. George stated that we already have about \$1,300 from gifts on hand. Dave added the amendment and after voting by hand, the motion passed.

Proposed Budget: The 2024 tracks about the same as the 2023 budget. Total Receipts \$61,170.00. Total Expenses \$13,440.00. Operating Profit \$13,440.00. Regular Dues \$70; Emeritus Dues \$35 after 7/25/2005; Application Fee \$230; Supplemental Fee \$230 ; Junior Fee \$50; Late Fee \$20; Reinstatement \$35 + Current dues. George Unsinger made the motion to approve the proposed budget. Holly Lohnes seconded, and by show of hands, the motion passed unanimously.

Kids' Corner:

Have Fun With Your Own Colonial Whirligig Toy

From antiquity, people have used their imagination and common materials to invent toys, many of them being active, kid-powered, and noise making (just like this whirligig). While we will probably never know who invented the first whirligig, evidence suggests this type of toy was independently invented and played with by children on several continents. Simple whirling toys such as the whirligig are described in European literature as early as the 17thCentury, and would have been as popular in Colonial America as they were in Europe. Additionally, numerous Native American whirligigs made of bone and clay have been found throughout the western United States, indicating the toy's antiquity in North America.

Because this toy could have easily been made with common materials, one can

imagine this toy amusing people from the colonial period right up to the present day.

Activity Supplies and Materials

2-3 Feet of string, yarn, or thin ribbon

1 large button or other round, button-shaped object

1 Pair of scissors

One or more Adults to assist young visitors (toymaking can be a fun group activity)

Instructions


Cut a length of string approximately 3 feet long. Thread the string through one hole in the button and then through the hole directly across.

Tie both ends of the string together into a knot.

From the back of the button, pull the string until the button is in the center, as shown below.

Hold one end of the loop in each hand. Then swing the whirligig around in a circular motion to wind the string.


As you pull your hands in and out, the button will spin to unwind and then rewind the string.




broad, spiny leaves prevent weeds, shade the soil to hold moisture, and protect the other plants against predators.




