More Good News from the Historians!

We love to be able to give you Good News and we have some to share! Do you know someone who wants to join our great Society? Do you want to apply for a Supplemental for other Passengers? Now is the time! While prices of everything are rising, our prices are going DOWN. Yes, you heard me right! We have been watching our expenses carefully and determined that our costs have gone down. The Board of Assistants voted to reduce



the prices. We charged \$230 for all applications. Now, the first application is \$199, a Supplemental is \$179, and a Silver Supplemental is \$159. (The difference between a Silver Supplemental and a Supplemental is that if the only change to the line is in the Silver Books, then it is a Silver Supplemental. Say you have John Alden and want to add Priscilla Mullins, that would be a Silver Supplemental.)

GSMD recognizes that the economy is bad, and they have helped to keep the cost down by not raising their prices. If you aren't aware, \$125 of the application fee goes to GSMD to pay their staff to process applications and the rest goes to SMD-SC to pay for our costs. Like the rest of the SMD-SC Board of Assistants, Historians are not paid. Applications across the world are down a little over 37% and GSMD staff has been cut by 60%. The new programs they have given us allow a more direct line to confirmed documentation eliminating the need to research and input. Please be aware that requirements have changed and an application may require more documentation to be approved today than in the past.

If you are interested in claiming another passenger, we may be able to help and it only takes a few minutes. With our new programs, we are able to enter your line in your previous application and see if there are any other documented lines. Please don't hesitate to contact us, we are here to help.

A Pilgrim Comes to Charleston

On Sunday afternoon, October 27th, a pilgrim flew into Charleston! Pilgrims don't usually travel by plane (favoring wooden boats instead), but Gabe Norwood, a pilgrim reenactor from Plimoth Patuxet Museums in Plymouth, MA, took to the air to join us for two action-packed days in Charleston County Schools.

Sunday evening Gabe and I met with Fran Clasby, a member of the Charleston County Constituent School Board, and Mary Ann and Eddie Taylor, who introduced me to Fran. Fran worked tirelessly to shepherd our pilgrim proposal through the board



approval process, and our plans would not have come together without Fran and the Taylors. I am so grateful to them! Everyone was delighted to meet Gabe and to hear more about our plans for the next day.



On Monday, Gabe and I left my home on Johns Island at the crack of dawn and made our way through traffic to Military Magnet Academy in North Charleston. Donna Eisen, the MMA Library Media

Specialist and my DAR sister, escorted us to the school library, where everything had been prepared for us. Gabe

delivered four 50-minute lessons to 127 students in 7^{th} and 8^{th} grades.

The program involved both an interactive lesson and a hands-on activity. Dressed as a pilgrim, Gabe asked the students to imagine themselves as his companions on the Mayflower. They imagined the library space as the Mayflower, and Gabe guided them to envision, one by one, "just one more thing" crowded into the space: 70 more people, barrels of provisions, animals, cannons, etc. Then he described the conditions – the smells, the jostling of the sea, the darkness – each time with a smile and the phrase,





"But don't worry, it only got a little bit worse!" The students were captivated and amazed that the pilgrims were willing to endure such conditions! Gabe rounded out this part of the lesson by explaining that the pilgrims formed two groups—those seeking economic opportunity and those seeking religious liberty.

After announcing the landing at Plymouth, Gabe explained the pilgrims' predicament – their arrival at "just the wrong time" due to delayed departure, their landing far from their intended destination -- and the many obstacles they faced. With his guidance, the students debated whether to return to England or not, offering reasons to stay and reasons to return. At this point, Gabe read the Mayflower Compact aloud, pausing at several points to highlight important aspects of the document and emphasizing it as an agreement among the pilgrims

to govern themselves. "Who made the rules back in England?" he asked. By contrast, "Who made the rules here?" Also, "Who is to be our leader?" "How do we decide that?" He made a clear contrast between the Compact and the Declaration of Independence, driving home the distinction between the colonial period and the revolutionary period.

At this point, the hands-on activity began. Gabe had brought with him 12 period-appropriate ink pots, worksheets with the alphabet printed in script taken from pilgrim writings, and some heavyweight linen paper. These were distributed to the students along with quill pens Gabe had made by hand from turkey feathers (ordered from Amazon!). Using the quills and ink, the students copied the script letters on the worksheets to form their own alphabets.

As the students mastered their quills, Gabe spoke about the treaty the pilgrims formed with the Wampanoag. He explained motivations on each side and asked the students to imagine how each side benefited from the arrangement. He explained that the pilgrims used beaver pelts, which they obtained by trade with the Wampanoag, to purchase from England many items needed for daily life. He brought this lesson to life by asking the students to guess which portion of his attire was made from a beaver pelt. Each incorrect guess afforded Gabe the opportunity to explain the way his shoes, belt, waistcoat, etc. were in fact



fabricated. When the students finally correctly identified his hat as made from beaver, he explained the process by which the hat was made. The students were fascinated!

As the lesson drew to a close, Gabe asked the students to take up their pieces of linen paper and sign their names. They imagined signing the Mayflower Compact themselves, as members of the Plymouth Colony. On their way out of the classroom, the students stroked the beaver skin which Gabe produced for them to touch.

We enjoyed our time at MMA, and returned to Johns Island with some takeout from Lewis BBQ in tow. Rising early the next morning, we drove 1.25 hours to



Thomas C. Cario Middle School in Mount Pleasant. History teacher Gerilyn Leland escorted us to her 8th-grade classroom, and Gabe once again delivered four 50-minute presentations, this time to 108 students. Chris Turpin, the social studies curriculum director for Charleston County Schools, joined us for one of the lessons, and he was quite impressed with Gabe's presentation. He is interested in seeing what our partnership with Plymouth might be able to bring in at the high-school level. Students from the Cario media production class also joined us to take some photos, and Gabe was interviewed on film by the school's news team. The interview was to form a segment of the school's daily in-house news broadcast.

There was no time to lose at the conclusion of the fourth presentation at Cario! We quickly gathered Gabe's materials and fled the premises before the daily student pickup process began. I dropped Gabe at the Charleston airport in time for his flight back to Boston. It was a whirlwind trip that left us exhausted but satisfied with the part we played in spreading the pilgrim story to the next generation!



In the days since Gabe visited, plans are moving forward to bring him back to Charleston and to reach schools in the upstate. We hope to bring Gabe or one of his colleagues from Plymouth Patuxet Museums to SC in the week leading up to our November 8th luncheon. The visit would culminate with a presentation to the SMD-SC at our fall luncheon in Greenwood.

Governor Maxie, the Store Volunteers and Store Profit Committee would like to thank our members and other shoppers, for their continued support of the SMD-SC Store and helping to support the new programs we are now able to bring to our state.

2024 Governor's Challenge Continues:


GSMD Governor General Lisa Pennington will be visiting South Carolina for our Spring 2025 Luncheon, in May. Governor General Pennington's mission while serving as Governor General is 'To Tell The Pilgrim Story'. How do we tell the story? One way is to complete the Mayflower Meetinghouse. It is the only asset we have that tells the story, and the Meetinghouse will fulfill our educational mission by telling the Mayflower story on the spot where it happened. It will be an educational center that explores the important contributions of the Pilgrims and the Wampanoag, and we can look forward to generating content for our Member Societies, schools and the public



about this important story. In the next three years, the Governor General wants to finish the funding of the Mayflower Meetinghouse with donations and grants and open it to the public. The Mayflower Meeting House will be where our education mission will take place.

Our guest speaker will be Governor General Lisa Pennington. Lisa Pennington is the Mayflower Society's Governor General for 2023-2026. She previously served as Counsellor General and Member-at-Large on GSMD's Executive Committee. She joined the Mayflower Society in 2000 and has held officer positions in both the Texas and Massachusetts member societies over the years.

Lisa earned her B.A. and J.D. from the University of Texas at Austin. She practiced business litigation for thirty-four years and was elected Managing Partner of her firm's Houston office for eighteen years until she retired in 2018. Lisa and her husband, David Furlow, have three children and five grandchildren and enjoy travel and speaking and writing on historical topics.

Middleton Place Tours

Two tours are available to SMD-SC members at Middleton Place on Saturday morning. Members staying at the Middleton Place Inn will need to pay only for their added tours, as your stay at the Inn includes General Admission to Middleton Place. Those members staying elsewhere must purchase General Admission to Middleton Place at a discounted rate of \$23.00 (vs. the usual \$32.00) and add the tour(s) at the

discounted prices below. To ensure your place on a tour, sign up when you make your Luncheon Reservation online or using the form on Page 32. A minimum of 10 people is required for tours to occur. We may combine the 10:00 AM and 10:15 AM House Museum tours, depending on reservation numbers.

Meet the Historic Livestock Breeds

Time: 9:15 a.m.—10:00 a.m. Location: Stable Yard

This guided tour takes a closer look at the historic livestock breeds at Middleton Place. Learn why the breeds were originally brought to Middleton in the 18th and 19th centuries and how each breed contributed to the plantation. Hear stories about the people who owned and cared for them.

This tour usually runs daily only at 11:30 a.m., but a special tour with additional time, access, and information will be offered for SMD-SC members at 9:15 a.m. for \$7.

House Museum Tour

Time: 10:00 a.m.-10:30 a.m. or 10:15 a.m.-10:45 a.m.

Location: Middleton House

This guided tour explores an historic structure built in 1755 at the direction of Henry Middleton. It was part of the three-building estate that looked over the Ashley River. Middleton House contains an extraordinary collection of furniture, paintings, books, artifacts, and documents

dating from the 1740s through the Civil War. Please note that the structure has limited handicap accessibility.

These times are reserved for SMD-SC Members for \$12.



Hotels:

We have reserved two blocks of rooms for our members to take advantage of at the Hampton Inn and at Middleton Place Inn.



Middleton Place Inn (4300 Ashley River Rd, Charleston SC 29414): your room will be riverfront with floor to ceiling windows. The rate includes admission for two to Middleton Place (\$60 value), a hot breakfast, reduced price happy hour (domestic beer: \$4; glass of wine: \$7), and a night cap of port and chocolate. If you stay at the Inn at Middleton Place, you may arrive Friday after 12:00 pm and enjoy the amazing gardens on Friday afternoon. You can join the Governor General and First Gentleman, along with SMD-SC members who stay at the Inn, for happy hour on the property at 5pm, as well as a nightcap at 9pm. There is a lovely restaurant located at Middleton as well.

Our room rate at the Inn at Middleton Place is \$275 (vs. published rate of \$369), with one queen bed, due when the room is reserved. Please note there are no elevators at the Inn at Middleton Place, so if you have challenges with stairs, be sure to request a first-floor room. Also note that our reduced rate (\$94 savings) is available only until March 3, 2025. If you intend to stay here, please reserve your room NOW. Also, please be aware that should you cancel before April 29, \$50 is nonrefundable. If you cancel on or after April 29, you will forfeit the entire \$275. However, we have been assured that if your cancellation is for a valid medical reason and you call Middleton Inn directly, they may be able to refund the room charge.

signed in April 2024. Members were greeted with the opportunity to Sign the Mayflower Compact as they entered the event. Each attendee was presented a replica of the Mayflower Compact, along with an explanation of what each phrase meant.

Mayflower Virtual Book Club





Mayflower Virtual Book Club Reviews

Here First: Samoset and the Wawenock of Pemaquid, Maine, by Jody Bachelder

The history of interaction between Samoset, the Sagamore (leader) of the Wawenock tribe in Pemaquid, Maine and the Pilgrims in Plymouth, Massachusetts, is extensively researched and presented by Jody Bachelder who grew up on the Pemaquid Peninsula in Maine. Interested in Pemaquid history, she began to research early written historical sources and learned the details of relationships that developed between the Indigenous people of Maine and the early European settlers. Her specific exploration and interpretation of historic records is impressive, inasmuch as these various sources were composed in difficult-to-understand early English style. Her comprehension of them is impressive. On March 16, 1621, as related in the writings of William Bradford and others, Samoset from Pemaquid, Maine, walked alone into the settlement of Plymouth and approached the Pilgrim settlers there, speaking words of greeting in English. Samoset was the first



Indigenous man to make contact with the colonists and his interesting background and knowledge of their language was surprising to them, to say the least. This unique event set in motion a series of remarkable interactions between two vastly disparate cultures. During the Mayflower Book Club Zoom discussions, members commented on the varied and dramatic interactions of these two groups and the effects on their respective cultures. In the years that followed the initial Samoset meeting, there were instances of cooperation but also times of costly wars, epidemics, and culture clashes. In addition, the author describes the historical impact of relationships between England and European countries that affected events of the day in New England. Book Club members observed that Ms. Bachelder's extensive detail is both informative and, at times, somewhat difficult reading. Those who participated in the Zoom discussions of this book all agreed that Here First clearly broadened knowledge and understanding of our Pilgrim ancestors and the time and place in which they lived.

Minutes of November 2, 2024 Board of Assistants Meeting

Ten Members of the SMD-SC BOA met at 2:00 p.m. Saturday, November 2, 2024. Those present were: Governor Melana Maxie, Deputy Governor Frances Frame, Treasurer George Unsinger; Historian Mary Brandenberger, Recording Secretary Marylen Jackson., Captain Dave Smith, Surgeon Melissa Gibbons, Palmetto Log Editor Deborah Hill, Assistant for Juniors Cari Gillette, and DGG Jeff Jackson. Those absent were: Corresponding Secretary Sarah Hoyle, Elder Desiree Voegele, Counselor Sarah Clingman, and Assistant for Education Holly Lohnes.

The Governor's report: Melana said she will get a notice to major SC newspapers for Compact Day November 21. She will send us a copy of her press release so we can put it in our local papers also. She noted that from our "Store" the best-selling items are handmade and engraved. She thanked members who had provided these. Online sales are not as profitable as those made in person, usually. The GSMD logo is now in use. The Zoom Book Club will be headed up by Ginny Laskowitz in 2025. The next BOA meeting will be January 25.

<u>Deputy Governor's report</u>: Frances Frame said that 66 reservations have been made for the Fall luncheon at the Reserve Club in Aiken next Saturday. Flowers have been ordered for the head table. The May 2, and 3, 2025 Spring Meeting will be held at Middleton Plantation in Charleston. The deadline for registration is March 2025. Four large tables will be reserved for the dinner at 7:30 on Friday night at Middleton. The Fall 2025 meeting will be held at the Poinsett Club in Greenville in November. The speaker will be the Plimoth/Patuxet Pilgrim impersonator.

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> George Unsinger showed charts of the Income and expenditures for January through October 2024. The present balance is \$311,843.77.

<u>Corresponding Secretary's Repor</u>t: Sarah Hoyle sent word that the name tags for the luncheon have been printed. No "Palmetto Logs" were returned this fall. She is still working on the Directory of Membership. A discussion was held about mailing them to our members. Dave Smith made the motion to only send them online, Cari Gilette seconded and motion passed unanimously. This will save our society a great deal of money.

<u>Historian's Report:</u> Mary Brandenberger announced that 15 applications are now being processed in Plymouth. She and her husband are now working on 15 more. 12 are waiting for additional documents, and 3 are waiting for payment. The online application generator is working well.

<u>Education Chairman's Report</u>: Holly Lohnes sent word that the checks have been sent to the winners of the 2024 contest.

<u>Palmetto Log Editor's Report</u>: Deborah Hill announced that all material for the Spring issue should be to her by Valentine's day 2025.

<u>Junior's Chairman's Report:</u> Cari Gillette said that we have added 8 new members from January through October, 2024. Two more are possible as soon as their mother 's application is accepted in Plymouth.

NEW BUSINESS: From the GBOA meeting in Asheville in September it was requested that each state society provide \$5,000 for the Governor General's project –(Renovation of the Meeting House in Plymouth.) Our South Carolina society has already collected about \$3000 to present to Gov. Gen Lisa Pennington when she attends our 2025 Spring meeting.

The Store Manager requested several items to purchase for the Store, such as more Mayflower ship night lights, and Glenn Cheney books (The First Thanksgiving). Dave Smith made the motion to purchase these items at a cost of about \$1,300. The cost to be taken out of store profits. Frances Frame seconded and the motion passed.

OLD BUSINESS: Frances Frame talked about the Plimoth/Pawtuxet/SC Education Plan. She told of the "John Howland" reenactor, Gabe Norwood who interacted with social studies students in two schools (The Military Magnet Academy in North Charleston, and the Thomas C. Cari Middle School in Mt. Pleasant.) Over 235 students were contacted in eight classes. The students were fascinated with him, his costume, and his explanation of the journey over on the tiny Mayflower ship, as well as the pilgrim's life after landing. Under this Plan another actor will visit schools in Greenville next spring. Frances was kind enough to get approval from the Charleston School District, and to provide Gabe with transportation, housing, and even ink for the children to use with their quills! All BOA members congratulated and thanked Frances for her good work. Our "Store" provided about \$3000 for this project. Foster's Outriders, a nonpartisan group, offered \$3000 because they liked the Plan so much. In 2026, the Plan will host a teacher educational progress event, so they can share the Pilgrim story with their students.

DGG Jeff Jackson suggested that the students who attend the "Plan" program should also be informed about our scholarship essay/project contests.

Melana brought news from the GBOA meeting, that the Texas society is making an educational Mayflower video to share with other societies.

The Citadel is providing a course on "Grant Writing" in the summer.

Minutes of January 25, 2025 Board of Assistants Meeting

Members present: Governor & Assistant General Melana Maxie; Deputy Governor Frances Frame; Historian Mary Brandenberger; Treasurer George Unsinger; Corresponding Secretary Sarah Hoyle; Recording Secretary Marylen Jackson; Captain Dave Smith; Surgeon Melissa Gibbons; Assistant for Juniors Cari Gillette; Assistant for the Palmetto Log Deborah Hill; Deputy Governor General Jeff Jackson; Former Governor Pat Sayko. Members not present: Assistant for Education Holly Lohnes; Chaplain Desiree Voegele; Counselor Sarah Clingman.

Governor Maxie welcomed all and called the meeting to order at 2 p.m. Dave Smith made the motion to accept the minutes of the November 2, 2024 BOA meeting as printed. George Unsinger seconded, and motion passed. Mary Brandenberger made the motion to accept the minutes of the November 9, 2024 Compact meeting as printed. Cari Gillette seconded, and motion passed.

The Governor's Report: SMDGovernor Maxie noted many of the events accomplished by SMD+SC during 2024. These include: two well-attended luncheon meetings; several interesting issues of the 'Palmetto Log'; scholarship applications were up; recognition by the SC House Of Representatives of Compact Day in November (with our hopes to make it permanent); good participation in the virtual Book Club (with Ginny Laskowitz to lead it in the future); profitable store sales; bringing a Pilgrim reenactor/educator to schools in Charleston (this will be written up in the "Mayflower Quarterly " and the "Palmetto Log"); good attendance at the GBOA meeting in Asheville where Dave Smith was honored with a 2024 GSMD Member Society Commendation Award for his extensive volunteer to GSMD or his Member Society. He received a Commendation Pin and a Certificate of Commendation and Appreciation. However, our membership has dropped from 462 to 415. There is standard maintenance of the website. The store sales are better at events in person. New coloring books and nightlights have not yet been ordered. She is looking for a new printer. She has sent extra tumblers and scarves to California and Maryland for sale at wholesale prices.

<u>Deputy Governor's Report:</u> Frances Frame announced that there are still rooms available at Middleton Place and the Hampton Inn in Charleston for our Spring Mayflower meeting on May 3, 2025, at which our Governor General Lisa Pennington will be the guest speaker. The "Meet and Greet" dinner on Friday night, before the luncheon, will be at the home of Frances on Johns Island. There will be brisket, trout and sides. A small bus has been rented to

take BOA members and their guests from Middleton Place to Frances' home. Guided tours have been arranged at Middleton Plantation for Saturday, for which we will pay ahead of time.

The Fall Compact Day luncheon/meeting will be at the Greenwood Country Club on Saturday November 8, 2025. Reservations for Friday night can be made at the hotel on the Square. Plans are being made for up to 25 people to tour "Stoney Point", a house built in 1813 by the ancestor of the lady now living there. It has been in her family ever since. The Friday night "Meet and Greet" information will be given later. Frances hopes to schedule a Pilgrim reenactor from Plymouth Patuxet to come two to three days before the luncheon/meeting (she hopes the reenactor will be Gabe, who came to Charleston last year) perform for and speak to primary school children in Charleston, then ride with her to Greenwood perform and speak to some classes there. The reenactor will also be our luncheon speaker. He/she may reenact for us, as for the students and tell us how he/she prepares for each education session.

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> George Unsinger was thanked by BOA members for his calling 50 or 60 members who did not pay dues (so BOA members did not have to call). The revenue in 2024 was about \$50,000 and expenses were \$8479.47. The checking account balance now is \$28,274.00.

<u>Corresponding Secretary's Report;</u> Sarah Hoyle noted that the society lost 34 members. We dropped 37;11 resigned; 5 transferred out and 2 transferred in. Her annual report is due February 1. She has almost completed the Directory and will email it to members soon.

<u>Historian's Report</u>: Mary Brandenberger announced that applications are down. Some only need a document or two. She spends a great deal of time writing proof arguments to help the applicants. 16 Applications were submitted in December and 8 in January. 4 were approved yesterday and 1 last week. Mary and her husband spend 50 to 60 hours a week on applications.

<u>Education Assistant's Report:</u> There was no report from Holly Lohnes, but scholarship applications are due May 1. We are still using South Carolina- National History Day themes.

<u>Palmetto Log Assistant's Report:</u> Deborah Hill said that the deadline for submissions is February 14. This publication will include new members, deaths, and Cari's "Kids Corner."

<u>Deputy Governor's Report</u>: Jeff Jackson announced that Governor General Lisa Pennington's and other speakers' webinars have been recorded and are available on the Mayflower Society's website if anyone missed the original ones. Also, the next virtual Book Club selection "Here First" has a video about it, which members might like to view (https://liberty.lib.me.us/online/here-first/). The next GBOA meeting will be held in San Antonio, Texas, beginning September 5, 2025.

NEW BUSINESS: Melana showed charts and announced a Silent Auction Challenge (presented at the September 2024 GBOA meeting in Asheville and explained on page 18 in the Winter 2024 Mayflower Quarterly) requesting each Member Society to provide a project or experience unique to each Society's region to be auctioned off. (Proceeds will go to the Meeting House.) Photos and descriptions must be in by June 1. It must be in a basket one person can carry. Melana searched for someone to head up this project. Jayne Larion with the help pf Pam Snyder will do this. The Experience they have crafted is called "The Charleston Experience" with 2 nights in a fine hotel, 2 dinners and a personally guided tour of the city, gift cards and maybe a book on Charleston -- all in a sweet grass basket.

Life Memberships - After discussions, it was decided to keep the fees for these the same as they have been. Regular membership dues will also remain the same.

Another discussion was held about charging members who requested a printed copy of the Palmetto Log rather than an email copy. Dave made the motion to charge them \$20 a year for this service. Mary Seconded. Frances amended the motion to charge the \$20 for only those under 81 years of age. Motion passed.

Indexers Needed!

The indexing program to digitally capture the life events of every generation, from verified Mayflower applications and the life details of our Mayflower ancestors for 400 years, is going strong!

We need your help in getting more applications indexed so that Easy App Generator is most useful in finding a close match for prospective members or for those looking for additional supplementals.

WHAT DOES A MAYFLOWER INDEXER DO?

View a previously approved application on a desktop computer or laptop, via the Internet using Google Chrome, Apple Safari, Microsoft Edge or Mozilla Firefox. Then, the Indexers enter that data in a form on the indexing platform specifically designed to mirror our applications for easy data entry.

An Internet connection is necessary for any device as this is a web-based tool. Nothing will reside on your laptop/desktop. Due to small screen size, indexing on smartphones and tablets is not possible.

Indexers will be assigned applications starting with the most recent applications as these have the most accurate, up-to-date information.

All applications will be indexed by two volunteers with a third "arbiter" making a final determination if there are discrepancies between the two indexers; therefore, Mayflower Indexers can do the best job they can, knowing more eyes will be reviewing the indexed data.

WHEN CAN A MAYFLOWER INDEXER INDEX?

Indexers can volunteer in their homes at times convenient to them for as much time as they want. The indexing platform will be open for business and available to Mayflower Indexers 24/7. You can do as little or as much as you have time for. Some indexers may complete one per week while a few are aiming to complete 200 per month.

WHAT TRAINING WILL BE PROVIDED TO MAYFLOWER INDEXERS?

A User Guide is available providing detailed instructions on how to capture all critical information from every generation. Note that the applications have changed over the years, so although we have tried to establish "rules", there are often exceptions.

Historian General Allie Golon and Member-at-Large Chris Schlosser are available to answer questions. We will also periodically host a group Zoom call to help address questions and common indexing issues.

WHO CAN BE A MAYFLOWER INDEXER?

Only Mayflower Society members are eligible to participate. To ensure the confidentiality of application data, all indexers are required to sign a Nondisclosure Agreement (NDA) form prior to starting the project.

WHY ARE MAYFLOWER APPLICATIONS BEING INDEXED?

The current system of accessing data from prior applications is mostly a manual process. Building new applications is entirely a manual process. Fully digitized applications and documentation and fully indexed applications will enhance access for Member Society Historians and Research Center staff and at the same time further preserve our treasure trove of Pilgrim descendants' historical data.






